On Friday 14 December 2018 our First Curriculum Enrichment day will take place. This day features many experiences not covered in our normal curriculum to help our students become informed citizens in the world. Many thanks to Miss Rushton for her hard work in organising this event.

On Monday 17 December 2018 representatives from St Joseph will accompany Mr Graham and Miss Collier to the BOSCEP Carol Service at Thornleigh. We will be taking along a cheque for £100 raised by students to support the local charity Urban Outreach. This charity support the financially deprived in our community and will be working to bring happiness to the needy in Bolton this Christmas.

After school on Tuesday 18 December 2018 we welcome Jason Bangbala who will be working with staff to train them on securing the most effective relationships with young people. Following this event our Year 7 and 8 Disco will take place in the school Hall from 6.30 - 8.30pm. Tickets for this event are available via the Pastoral team.

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On Wednesday 19 December 2018 we will be celebrating our End of Term Advent Services. Students will participate in one of two assemblies where they will reflect on our Advent theme. The assemblies will be followed by our School Christmas Dinner.

We are delighted to announce our Elite Learners Reward trip to the Trafford Centre on Thursday 20 December. This is a new initiative for Year 11 and we intend to roll it out to other year groups. To be an Elite learner, students must be on target in at least 6 of their subject areas. We use student voice to plan how to reward these students and incentivise achievement.

We welcome members of our community to our SVP Senior Citizens' Party on Thursday 20 December at 2.00pm, where our SVP volunteers will enjoy serving others and spreading the Christmas spirit.

Friday 21 December will bring the term to a close. On this day, we ask that students bring £1 in return for coming in their own clothes. This money will be split between Revive (Victims of sex abuse), Urban Outreach (the deprived in the Bolton community) and the Jimmy Mizen appeal (A charity set up by the parents of a murdered teenager to show the painful consequences of violence) Margaret and Barry Mizen have worked with our young people.

Uniform matters... Many thanks to parents and carers who have supported us as we instil high standards of conduct and uniform. After Christmas we often see the emergence of new hoodies, phones, piercings and non-regulation footwear. Please check that your child has a plain warm coat and black 'polishable' shoes. Remember that we have a new uniform in place in September 2019. Therefore, if you have items of uniform that your child has grown out of, please bring it into school so that we can organise a 'swap shop' and avoid parents and carers having to buy new uniform for the remainder of the year. Snapchat – The big delete. One of the biggest challenges in young people's lives is the need to live up to expectations on social media. The site that causes our student support team the most issues is Snapchat. This allows young people to send an image to another person and so long as it is not 'screen shot' the evidence will be deleted. Clearly, this encourages young people to send inappropriate images with the hope that they will not have to face the consequences. The minimum age requirement for Snapchat is 13. Those between the ages of 13 and 17 are required to have parental consent. We thank those parents who have acted responsibly and taken our advice to remove their child's Snapchat account. It is an offence to make, send or possess an inappropriate image of a minor. If your child receives an image they are at risk. Therefore, if you

do not remove this app from your child's phone, you are putting your child at risk of engaging in criminal activity.

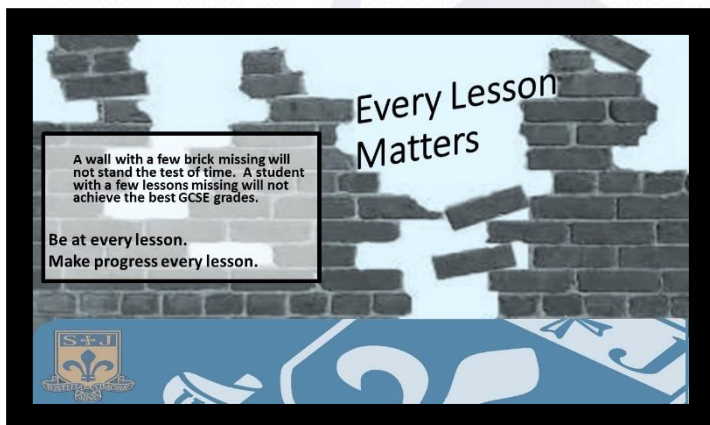
